See you at the Reef

Time is running out to sign up for the 2011 RMOWP conference, which takes place June 8-12 at Capitol Reef National Park in southern Utah, with headquarters in the adjacent community of Torrey.

Capitol Reef (www.nps.gov/care) offers plenty to see and do, ranging from wildlife along a picturesque river and spectacular multi-colored rocks, to geologic wonders and prehistoric and historic sites.

Lighting in Capitol Reef is good in the morning (sunrise around 6:00am in early June), lousy at midday, and terrific in late afternoon and evening (sunset about 8:45pm), so plan to get out early, take an afternoon siesta, and stay out late. Trail Wizard Jack Olson will be getting to the park early to check trail conditions and prepare handouts with the latest information on where to go and when.

We'll have guided photo tours into two of the most scenic areas of the park and surrounding areas - Cathedral Valley and Burr Trail - with a wellrespected local outfitter (Hondoo Rivers & Trails, www.hondoo.com). However, because of National Park Service requirements for no more than a dozen people including guides on commercial backcountry trips, we must limit the number of participants to ten per trip and spread the trips over several days. Hondoo has asked for our numbers in early April, so

please send in your registration form with your photo tour choice marked as soon as possible.

The writing critique has a new twist this year, with plans to publish works submitted in an outdoor journal. Participating authors retain complete copyright except for the right to publish this work in the journal. Papers submitted may include stories, poems, photo essays, or other format, on the outdoors, and each author should bring a draft of the paper to the conference to read in the writing workshop. RMOWP members will help critique the work and give feedback. After the workshop, authors will have one month to rewrite as they wish and send the final to the editor (Wayne Turner) who will publish the journal and mail a copy to each author and any other interested members. Additional information will be found in the Jan-Feb newsletter.

The conference also includes ranger-guided tours to historic sites, several workshops, a sunrise photo shoot, and opportunities to see RMOWP members' photography.

Conference headquarters will be at the Sandstone Inn (www.sandstonecapitolreef.com), which has a meeting room and restaurant. Cost for conference attendees for one or two people is \$62 plus tax per night for the very adequate standard room, and there are also a limited number of more upscale rooms, with microwave and fridge, for \$10 more.

We've blocked 30 standard rooms from June 6 to 11 - that's Monday through Saturday nights - so those who want to arrive early will have a place to stay,

OWAA Writing Workshop

Outdoor Writers Association of America (OWAA) is back with its **second annual Goldenrod Writing Workshop**, July 31 to August 6 at The University of Montana in Missoula. Open to both novice communicators and published professionals, the week-long workshop is designed to improve skills in outdoor, nature, and environmental writing.

This year's workshop offers a casual setting with hands-on learning from peer groups and veteran instructors. The curriculum includes assignments, discussions, readings, and shared critiques along with time to explore the beautiful Montana outdoor wilderness and socialize with others who share a passion for outdoor writing.

Enrollment is limited to 30 students, on a first come, first served basis. The \$995 fee includes tuition and room and board in University of Montana campus housing. The deadline for applications is June 1, and requires a \$250 non-refundable deposit.


Celebrate National Park Week

Getting Americans outside and active is the focus of National Park Week, April 16-24, and to help encourage us to visit America's national parks, entrance to all national parks is free throughout the week.

"National parks have always been great places to go on vacation, have fun, and learn something, but for millions of Americans national parks are also a daily part of a healthy lifestyle," National Park Service Director Jonathan B. Jarvis said. "If you've never thought of your national parks that way, we'd like to invite you to come out to see how parks can help you meet your fitness goals."

In addition to waiving entrance fees throughout the week, many national parks are offering programs as part of National Park Week festivities. On Saturday, April 16, many parks will be looking for volunteers to help with projects, and on Saturday April 23, kids will be special guests for the 5th annual Junior Ranger Day. 
Jack's Jaunts On the road to Capitol Reef

No matter how you get to our 2011 conference in Capitol Reef, the route will not be straight. It will be quite crooked. It will go this way, and then it will go that. Some, driving from the east, will begin on Interstate 70. Others, coming from more southerly locations, may ramble in on a variety of road choices. Eventually, most will be entering Capitol Reef through Hanksville on Utah 24. We'll look at some sights along the way, worth a stop coming or going.

First, for those traveling west on I-70 from Colorado, about 15 miles past Green River take exit 147 onto Utah 24 and head south. About 24 miles along, there's a road westerly to Goblin Valley State Park. It's about 12 miles to the park entrance.

I have to make a confession: this is my first recommended "Jaunts" location to a place I've never been. But I've heard many positive reports about the park.

There are wild, sculpted features, with many areas suitable for hiking. They also have camping facilities at the park. As in most desert sites, midday light will be flat for photography. Check out various web sites for more information and photos of Goblin Valley State Park. I'll go there someday. (ed. note - Barb & I have been to Goblin Valley, camped there in fact. It's a fun fantasyland of oddly-shaped rock formations - many resembling mushrooms - that makes you smile. And it's in the middle of nowhere, with no light pollution, offering a spectacular star show when conditions are right.)

There are several great stops for those of you coming in from the south on US 191 and US 163. Near Mexican Hat, Utah 261 heads north. Soon after

entering this highway, Utah 316 goes west a few miles to Goosenecks of the San Juan State Park. There's an overlook providing an expansive view down onto the

serpentine meandering of the San Juan River. This can be a short, but dramatic, stop for the view.

Back on Utah 261, drive north some 30 miles and hang a left on Utah 95. In just 2 miles you can take



the excruciatingly thin Owachomo Bridge (Natural Bridges National Monument)

Utah 275 into Natural Bridges National Monument. If you have the time, it's really worth it to view one or more of the three natural bridges in the park. Each bridge - Sipapu, Kachina, and Owachomo - has its own short trail. The trails range from ½ mile to 1½ miles round-trip. The three bridges are markedly different from each other. A 9-mile loop road covers the trailheads in the park. There are overlooks from the road which present views of the bridges but these are not nearly as worthwhile as a hike to at least one of the bridges. It's fun. Hiking all three might involve two to three hours in the park.

After Natural Bridges, you will reenter Utah 95, go right, and keep traveling some 90 miles to Hanksville. Along the way, you'll cross the Colorado River at **Hite Marina**, at the northern end of **Lake Powell**. There are colorful views of the deep blue lake surrounded by red rock cliffs. At Hanksville you'll take Utah 24 west into Capitol Reef National Park, traveling along the Fremont River.

Just so that you're aware of it, there's an orientation pullout at the east entrance to Capitol Reef. Right here the paved Notom Road begins its southward climb east of the park. The road becomes unpaved, enters the national park, and reaches the top of the Waterpocket Fold after some 30 miles from Utah 24. For those of you choosing to take the Burr Trail Photo Field Trip during the conference, you will be returning via the Notom Road.

After this prelude, adventure awaits in Capitol Reef. And if you want to visit the above sights on the way home, just reverse the directions.

That was one big and bright moon on the evening of March 19, and Jon Sheppard had perfect sky conditions at his home near Vail, Colorado, to capture it. Commonly called a Super Moon, it appears larger and brighter because it is closer to the earth than usual due to the oval shape of the moon's orbit. Scientists say the Super Moon, which they prefer to call a Perigee Moon, appears about 14% larger and 30% brighter than when the moon is at its furthest from earth. It will be another 18 years before the moon comes this close again.


Other Member News

includes 129 maps, and has a list price of \$15.95.


