But don't despair, Jack will get back to you as soon as he can.

A continuing discussion at the board level concerns Supporting Members: what we do for them, and suggestions of new ones to approach and how. In an effort to educate all of us in what various Supporting Members do, Ben Moffett volunteered to contact them and write a series of articles for our newsletter. He has begun his research, but if any of you wishes to tackle a specific Supporting Member, get in touch with Ben and let him know. In addition, any time any of us does something (an article or mention in a book, etc.) about one of our SMs, please let them – and us – know about it.

For instance, Don and I are working on a guide to short hikes in Arizona and are utilizing a global positioning system (GPS) in conjunction with computerized maps we obtained from Maptech, who has been a supporting member for some years. The results are fascinating and verge on intimidating: we return from a hike, download the trail data from the GPS into our laptop where resides the quad-map from Maptech, and voila! There's the trail exactly where it should be on the map. Of course what also shows up are our detours and side trips, usually the result of hiker's confusion. Once we complete the research (we've done about a third so far) I'll write a précis for Maptech, which they can use on their website or wherever they like.

In addition, we will spend a minute or two discussing Writing Groups and how to start one in your neighborhood or town.

Field Trip Background

One of our field trips will be the Missionary Ridge Wildfire Restoration Project with the U.S. Forest Service. The Missionary Ridge fire started on June, 9, 2002 during a very dry summer after a dry winter. The area is northeast of Durango. Over 40 days, the fire covered 72,962 acres destroying 56 homes and 27 out-buildings. After the fire, satellite images were taken to understand the severity and range of the wildfire. The results showed that of the 72,962 acres involved, 22,542 acres burned at high severity, 21,822 at moderate severity, 13,872 at low severity, and 14,728 acres were essentially unburned. This field trip should provide an interesting insight into wildfires and how humans are dealing with the results.

June 1 is the acceptance deadline for the 2003/2004 Scott-McKenna Memorial Scholarship. There is an entry form in this newsletter, and you should be able to access one at the RMOWP web site. This annual award provides from \$500 to \$1,000 to a deserving student who will study...communications and the outdoors, naturally!

Joe McKenna, veteran sport-show organizer and the man whose inspiration formed RMOWP in 1973, and J.B. Scott, another founding member, were ardent supporters of this concept and the scholarship is named in their memory.

Who is eligible? Candidates must be nominated by a current member of RMOWP and should be enrolled in college, or will attend next year. Students from high school seniors and into graduate school are eligible. In keeping with the original intent of the scholarship, it is restricted to students in the fields of outdoor writing or photography.

The money comes from funds set aside by the board each year, after a review of our finances. Auctions raise funds at annual conferences. Donations are also welcome, and we are fortunate that an anonymous benefactor has matched the RMOWP amount in many years. The scholarships began in 1991.

2004 RMOWP Photo Workshop

As you know, the 2004 Photo workshop is scheduled for June 11-15. We have just enough participants to hold the workshop but still have openings available.

We seem to have had a limited number of inquiries this year. I plan to visit with John Catsis at the Durango conference to compare these inquiries to those in the prior years. I would appreciate any input from our members as to how we can reach more outdoor enthusiasts and make them aware of our workshop. Please think about it and if you have a thought I'd be happy to visit with you during the conference or via telephone (918-225-2721) or email (Tomc1114@cox.net) for those not attending. I'm open for ideas or suggestions. We have a great product but it's hard to market it with our limited funds so please pass your thoughts to me.

Now a candidate for Master of Fine Arts in Photography at New Mexico State University, Frank Hamrick was awarded last year's Scott-McKenna Memorial Scholarship in the amount of \$500. He received a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Photography from the University of Georgia in 1998.

In a statement from Frank, he said it all started when he was 10 years old using a cheap 35mm camera from an auto dealership promotion. He photographed cows, deer, his dog, and other things found in his rural surroundings. His formal fine art studies improved his technical skills, but he said he was having trouble with content until a professor encouraged him to photograph the world as he saw it, which led to a philosophy he uses today.

Frank said, "The intent of my photography is to stir a person's emotions. Emotions are universal. I capture feelings on film and put them out there for the viewer to respond to. The images are of people and places with individuality and texture. The people are real, every-day folks you do not see on television dramas or in magazine advertisements. The places are not prettied up for the photographs I create. I believe my photographs stand out from the world, which is becoming increasingly homogenized and synthetic."



Mr. Hamrick's resume includes a long list of exhibitions, broad experience in various photography related employments and one book published by Nexus Press titled "I found it when I stopped looking."

Frank was selected to receive the scholarship by the Fine Arts faculty at New Mexico State University. RMOWP's normal process for scholarship selection did not produce a winner last year so the Board decided to let NMSU select the winner. NMSU was chosen because they have been a Supporting Member of RMOWP for a number of years.

Digital Photos Contest Ideas

As co-chair of the awards committee, I got to thinking that many of us are now into digital photography, but we can only enter three color images as prints and another three as black & white prints. That doesn't seem quite fair.

During the Durango conference, we'll have a discussion about the best way to include digital photography in the 2005 Photo/Writing Contest.

A few ideas:

- Have a separate digital photography category with the same nine topics as we have for slides. That would mean up to 25 more awards.
- Combine 35mm slides and digital photos in the same category with the nine topics.
- We need to have a standard way to submit digital photos, such as on CD, 4x6, and 150 dpi, or whatever is deemed appropriate. Suggestions requested!
- We also have to figure out the best way for judges to judge the digital category and especially if we combine 35mm and digital photography into one category. Again, suggestions appreciated.
- We'll need a computer projector to project digital entries and winners at conference. We'll have a demo this year with a projector Photo Workshop coordinator Tom Cummings has agreed to lend us.

Come prepared to discuss various ways to include digital photography in our annual awards contest and "slide" show.



Pure Fishing

(First of a series of articles on RMOWP supporting members by RMOWP writers).

Not by a long shot. This RMOWP supporting member is the world's largest fishing tackle company with a portfolio of brands that include all those famous ones we regularly use including Abu Garcia, Berkley, Fenwick, Johnson, Mitchell, Red Wolf, and Spider.

While these brands are as popular as ever, they now fall under the corporate banner of Pure Fishing, headquartered in Spirit Lake, Iowa, and privately owned by the Bedel family, who started out with the Berkley line. Tom Bedell, son of founder Berkley Bedell, is the company chairman. The elder Bedell, a U.S. Representative, started the company in 1937.

Despite merger mania typical of that going on in other sectors of the economy, Pure Fishing is holding true to its ideals. "The Angler Is Our Boss" is a part of its strategic principles, along with a takeoff of the Golden Rule: "Treat Others As We Would Like to Be Treated."

Growth is also part of the mission: "The World Is Our Marketplace" and "Financial Strength Creates Opportunity."

In the last year or so, the company added the Stren Fishing line business to its lure and rod and reel company. It bought Stren from Remington, the maker of rifles and shotguns, after Remington decided to unload it to focus on its core firearms business.

To its credit, Pure Fishing announced that it is adding manufacturing, warehouse and distribution jobs in Iowa as it reduces Stren's use of outsourcing — the practice of turning over work to companies outside the United States.

The company, which Bedell founded by tying flies in his parents' basement, now has seven regional operational centers across the world and 2,000 employees worldwide.

Whatever you need to know about Pure Fishing you can find by Googling, but "pure fishing" is a generic as well as a business term and you might make a couple of false starts. Look for "Pure Fishing America" or go directly to the website at www.purefishing.com.

Links to the individual dealership lines and their locations can be found there, as well as a spiel on "aquatic stewardship," which notes that the company "embraces" the Endangered Species Act and "supports meaningful cooperation between federal and state agencies in balancing the importance of protecting listed species and providing recreational opportunities."
